What is the Prostate?

The **prostate** gland is a small organ located below the bladder and in front of the rectum in men. It produces a liquid that forms part of semen. The prostate uses a male hormone called testosterone to work normally.

Symptoms of Prostate Cancer

- Frequent urination, especially at night
- Difficulty starting or
- Weak flow of urine
- Pain or burning when urinating
- Painful ejaculation during sexual intercourse
- Blood in urine or semen
- stopping the flow of urine Pain or stiffness in the lower back, hips, or upper thighs

*You may not have any symptoms in the early stages



Testing for Prostate Cancer

Blood test – PSA (prostate-specific antigen)

• The level of PSA in the blood is high in men who have prostate cancer.

Rectal exam

 Your doctor inserts a lubricated, gloved finger into your rectum to feel for hard or lumpy areas in the prostate.
